President Samia earns kudos for conserving environment

Govt chemists resolve to forge cooperation

ATURAL Resources and Tourism Minister Mohamed Mchengerwa yesterday inaugurated a modern information centre in Serengeti National Park that is expected to help attract more tourists to visit the country.

The information centre has been constructed at Seronera, the headquarters of the worldfamous park with the support of the Korean International Cooperation Agency (KOICA).

Mr Mchengerewa welcomed the multimillion projects saying the ministry will further enhance its cooperation with South Korean government in areas of conservation and tourism.

William Mwakilema said the information centre will provide a wider space for tourists to enjoy while in the country's second largest national park covering 14,763 square kilometres.

"More importantly, with the help of this information centre, we are expecting to increase average number of days spent by tourists in Serengeti from 1.9 day to 3 days," CC Mwakilema said his remarks during the in colourful event.

As a result, the tourism facility will both raise a number of tourists visiting the park as well as boosting the government revenue for the national development. Besides enhancing visi-
